




Justified text has a straight edge at both the left and the right margins (apart from the final line in a paragraph). This is done by adjusting the spacing between words.






Remember that a heading is regarded by Word as a single-line paragraph.

Formatting paragraphs

The Mini Toolbar gives you the ability to switch centering On and Off, adjust the left indent or create a bulleted list. For most paragraph-level attributes, however, you'll use the Paragraph section of the Home tab.

Alignment

- If you want to change just one paragraph then simply click anywhere within it. To change multiple paragraphs, select them using any of the techniques seen earlier
- Click on one of the alignment icons to choose left, centered, right, or justified alignment. There is an example of each type illustrated below




- To see more paragraph controls, click the small open dialog icon in the lower-right corner of this section. The dialog that appears has two tabbed pages: "Indents and Spacing" and "Line and Page Breaks". These give you accurate control over attributes such as line spacing, indentation, and hyphenation
- Click OK in the dialog to view the changes to the text, or Cancel to discard any changes you made while in the dialog



Bulleted lists

- Enter the text for your list, pressing the Return key after each item. Select this text
- Open the Bullets pop-up menu in the Paragraph area of the Home tab



then choose Define New Bullet. From this dialog you can select any symbol or picture






A quick way to create a bulleted list is to type an asterisk at the beginning of the first line. Word will automatically change this to a bullet, and format this and all subsequent lines for you. When you have finished. leave the next line blank and just press Return. Word will then switch off the bulleted effect.



From the Define New Bullet dialog you can choose any image or character from a font for your bullet. Many fonts, such as Wingdings and Dingbats, are pictorial this makes them a good source for bullets.


Numbered lists




This behavior may not always be what you want. If it is not, then click on the AutoCorrect icon that appears by your text. You can then undo the automatic numbering just for this example, or disable the feature for future lists



Twelve grams of self-lowering flour








If you choose Control AutoFormat Options you will call up a dialog with settings for this plus many other automatic features.




From the Numbering pop-up menu choose Define New Number Format to fully customize the style, format and alignment.



Multilevel lists


- 1 Create the text for your list. Press the Tab key at the beginning of a line once for each level of indent
- Open the Multilevel pop-up menu in the Paragraph section and select the desired style





You can use the Change List Level option in the Multilevel pop-up menu to move an item to a higher or lower level. Alternatively, click at the beginning of a line and use Tab to move right or Shift + Tab to move left.

- If you want to choose your own custom settings then select Define New Multilevel List
- By clicking the Font button in this dialog you can control the appearance of the number at each level of the list, separately from the main text





You can also sort lists as text (alphabetic), numbers or by date. To do this, first select the list then click the sort icon in the Paragraph area of the Home tab.
